OPRA 2017 CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHT

Back in February of this year, Annie Frisoli took 12 students with her to the annual Ohio Parks and Recreation Association Conference and Trade Show. This annual conference is held in Sandusky Ohio and features Parks and Recreational professionals from across Ohio. This conference showcases many different areas in the parks and recreation with workshops, networking events, and an exhibitor hall.

Prior to attending the conference, the students managed to fundraise enough money to help reduce costs and allow for all interested students from Ohio University to attend the conference. It's safe to say, Ohio University was well represented with the most students, compared to other universities that attended.

Many of the students who attended walked away with great insight on the profession. Kent Orr, a senior Recreation Management undergrad, commented on his experience "I walked away from OPRA with personal and direct professional advice, as well as an internship. Add in the fact that the speakers during workshops were high caliber in their delivery and content, plus the general amiability of all attending, and OPRA left me with an outstanding impact that made a real change in my career and professional goals". For him, the OPRA conference left a significant impact on his academic and professional career.

Graduate students from the program also assisted with fundraising and attended the conference. Anna Spittler, a graduate student in Recreation Studies, commented on how beneficial it was to attend a conference that provided enough diverse workshops and opportunities for students to gain, with their specific interest in the parks and recreation field. She also commented on the opportunities the conference staff provided specifically for students. "The conference staff plans specific meetings for students to acclimate them to the conference, as well as network with one another. Also, students are given a mentor that can assist them throughout the conference in many different ways - to eat lunch with, to review a resume, to walk the exhibit with, to introduce to appropriate people, to discuss future plans, etc.".

The conference was both a professional and fun experience for the students. The 2018 OPRA Conference will be held January 28 through the 31 at the Kalahari Convention Center in Sandusky, Ohio. Students are all encouraged to participate in this opportunity and may even walk away with more than what was expected. Along with focusing on his course work, Elliot has also been involved with the recreation program as an undergraduate teaching assistant for the Fundamentals of Rock Climbing course and the Wilderness Living Skills course offered by the Recreation

Studies program. He also currently works for Outdoor Pursuits as a supervisor at the climbing wall and as a trip leader. His favorite outdoor activities are rock climbing, backpacking, and cross-country skiing.

Elliot first became involved in the outdoor world when he started scouting in the first grade and then in high school realized he could turn what he loved doing as a personal passion into a career.

This past summer was Elliot's second summer working at Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico, where he spent three months as a head climbing instructor. During his time as head climbing instructor, he was able to develop his leadership skills and gain additional teaching experience. His favorite part of outdoor recreation and education is the education part, he likes teaching people about the outdoors, interpersonal skills, and technical skills.

When asked what Elliot likes best about the Recreation Studies program Elliot responded "The professors come to mind, the professors really enjoy what they are doing." He also mentioned that many of the classes are project based and they provide practical work experience.

Elliot plans on graduating in December of 2018. Prior to graduation, he plans on taking classes on campus in the spring, complete his internship in the summer with Philmont Scout Ranch, where he has been offered an assistant director position at one of their climbing camps, and complete his final fall semester by participating in a three month National Outdoor Leadership School (NOLS) outdoor educator course. After graduation Elliot wants to work seasonally for a few years either in camps or in an expeditionary format because "it would be a blast." He hopes to get a chance to explore the country before working towards a managerial role in the field.

1. Event Manager

As an Event Manager you create and develop event projects such as festivals, adventure races, and other large-scale gatherings. Event Managers spend hours making sure concepts and details fall in line to create a spectacular event. And when you do this well, your event will resonate beautifully with attendees' memories (and, in the case of fundraisers, their wallets).

2. Outdoor Educator

As skilled leaders in outdoor and environmental education and recreation, Outdoor Educators range from university professors to professional guides with a variety of professions in between. With a passion for the outdoors

and appreciation for the wilderness, Outdoor Educators are leaders in their field.

3. Ecotourism

According to the International Ecotourism Society, Ecotourism can be defined as, "responsible travel to natural areas that conserves the environment and sustains the well-being of local people." Most ecotourism experiences are aimed at helping people to foster an appreciation of the environment, the conservation of wildlife, plants and resources, and respect and understanding of native peoples.



4. Campus Recreation Director

Campus recreation administrators direct and oversee the exercise, sports and other related activities for colleges or universities. Their responsibilities can include managing budgets, creating programs, overseeing employees and collaborating with students and school officials to promote involvement in campus activities. Campus recreation administrators must maintain current recreational programs and facilities and develop and implement new programs.

5. Recreation Center Director

Recreation directors oversee programs in public and private parks, sports facilities and community centers. If you enjoy making social, environmental, cultural, and/or economic impacts on individuals and communities, then this is a career for you.



6. Park Ranger

A park ranger is charged with protecting nature from people and people from nature. Park rangers strike a delicate balance between conservation and resourcefulness, so people can enjoy the splendor of nature without causing permanent damage to the animals and plants that call the wild their home. To do that, park rangers oversee camping, research, education, and other events that take place at their park throughout the year.
